DATO, LUIS G. (Luis Guevara Dato) aka Isarog. b. Baao, Camarines Sur 4 Jul 1906 d. 1983. Poet. Born to Eugenio Dato and Barbara Guevarra, he studied at the Naga Elementary School, Camarines Provincial High School, and University of the Philippines (UP) High School. He completed his associate in arts in 1926 and took law studies at the UP in 1927-1928 and 1933-1934. In 1950 he obtained his bachelor of science in education at the Nueva Caceres College, Naga City. He became the head of the English department of the University of St Anthony, Iriga City and was also a journalist at the *Bicol Star* and *Naga Times*. In the mid-1970s, he stopped writing and concentrated on farming.

Dato began writing when he was a student, and wrote poems for the *Philippine Collegian* and *Philippine Magazine*. His published works are *Filipino Poetry*, 1924, the first anthology of Filipino poems in English; *Manila: A Collection of Verses*, 1926; *My Book of Verses*, *I*, 1936, and its undated second part; and *The Land of Mai: A Philippine Epic*, 1975.

In 1965 he was named "Outstanding Catholic Poet" by the United Poet Laureate International.
